





Taking the Bus to NBCC Saint John

View Bus Routes and Schedules

Red highlighted areas are within a 500m walk to the stops of bus routes directly serving NBCC Saint John.


Yellow highlighted areas are within a 500m walk to routes that connect to NBCC with one transfer on a standard fare.

For all routes, including those that require additional connections, follow the bus schedules link above.

Zoom in to see bus stops and transfer points.

The routes that directly serve NBCC are:

- 30 Champlain Heights
- 33 Champlain Express









Prince William's Walk





1. Market Square & New Brunswick Museum

Market Square derives its name from Learly function as a market place for the city. The Great Fire of 1877 destroyed all the buildings of Market Square










Mount Pleasant Area

1. 17 Seely Street

17 Seely Street, residence of Edward Goodwin, owner of Goodwin & Co. grocers, famous as the first importer of fresh fruit to Saint John, the Maritimes and Quebec. Craftsman style (stick variation) c. 1910.
